

Origin of the Crowley Name Compiled & Researched by Joseph Crowley, born near Kilmihil, retired to Cork City

The ancestral home of the Crowleys is West Cork. One of the surviving Crowley Castles may be seen in the vicinity of the town of Dunmanway. It is interesting to note how the O'Crowley got his name. King Brian Boru's army at Clontarf (Good Friday, 1014 A.D.) consisted mainly of Claremen, South Galwaymen and Munstermen. Among the Munstermen was the O'Crowley and his clansmen from Desmond. They had the reputation of being tough, hard-fighting men. O'Crowley's troops at Clontarf were close to King Brian's tent. They occupied the high ground overlooking Dublin Bay and formed the core of his reserve troops.

Tradition records that Clontarf was a very bloody battle with victory ebbing and flowing every hour, the Irish and the Danes being bowled over like ninepins. Despite the rigours of old age, King Brian quickly assessed the situation, and fearing stalemate, sent for the O'Crowley and said: Amois, a Cruadh Laoich, taisbean dom neart do laimhe (Now, Hard Warrior, show me the strength of your hand). Tradition further relates that the O'Crowley and his clansmen tore into battle and, after hard fighting, broke the back of the Danish resistance.

From Marian's Desk

It's time to start packing for Ireland. Walking shoes. Check. Raincoat. Check. Camera. Check. Film. Check. Genealogy. Check, check, check. Hope springs eternal. Maybe this time I will finally find those elusive Crowley ancestors!

I remember my first trip to West Cork. I was sure it wouldn't be all that difficult. After all, I had my great grandfather's name, John Crowley. I had his parents' names, Timothy Crowley and Catherine Monahan. I had Catherine's birthplace, Scully Parish, County Cork. And I had John's birth date, 17 March 1848. What more could I possibly need?

First of all I needed correct information which I obviously didn't have. I'd taken most of what I had from a printed genealogy done by a relative. There is no Scully Parish in Cork. But there is a Schull Parish. One of the most common names there is Minahane, not Monahan. There were hundreds of Irish immigrants who used St. Patrick's Day as their birth date. And two of the most common names in West Cork are John Crowley and Timothy Crowley.

With so little to go on it is no wonder that I made no progress on that trip in 1995. The good news was that I met so many interesting Crowleys that I didn't mind at all. Everyone at that Crowley Gathering was my cousin. I felt right at home. And I was.

This trip I plan to walk some old cemeteries in the areas I think my Crowleys came from. I plan to take lots of pictures of those places and talk to lots of people there. I hope to have time to visit the Heritage Center in Skibbereen. Unfortunately I won't have time to visit the National Library in Dublin.

Father Tom Hayes, who maintains the Cork and Ross Diocese website, advises genealogists, "Because browsing the (parish) register is time consuming, most local clergy are reluctant to search for records without very specific dates." But if you have the time, all baptism records prior to 1890 have been microfilmed and are available for research at the National Library in Dublin. Happy hunting, and I hope to see you in Bantry.

Clarification of the Fee Schedule for the Crowley Clan Gathering This September

The Crowley Clan Committee reports that there has been some misunderstanding about the fee structure for the Crowley Clan Gathering this coming September. If you did not prepay before June 1, there is still time to send your payment to your country representative before August 1. Or you can pay when you arrive at the gathering in Bantry. To clarify, the fee structure is as follows:

€150 per person for:

- Music and entertainment for three nights
- The banquet on Saturday night
- · Bus hire for two and half days
- Insurance for castle visits and road bowling (required)
- Offerings for Mass Rock site
- Contribution for two Castle site visits
- Printing, advertising, name tags, and guest speaker honorarium
- Stipend for Crowley Castle project

Despite the fact that there are normal operating expenses every year, website expenses, Crowley Castle site maintenance, there are no dues or fees to belong to the Crowley Clan. But when there is a Gathering in Ireland those attending are expected to help pay the cost of the Gathering. The committee has solicited some local sponsorships, but this is minimal and does not come close to covering expenses.

Additionally, during the weekend, the Irish Gardai (police) have advised against private vehicles at the sites due to traffic conditions, narrow roads, and limited parking.

The €50 fee originally mentioned, was for those attending the banquet only, - *no other functions*, and they would be expected to contribute to some of the above expenses as well.

The Crowley Clan Committee thanks you for your understanding and apologizes for any confusion.
