

#### Minutes of the CC Council April Meeting

The Crowley Clan Council met on the evening of 27th April at Jerry Crowley's pub in Crossmahon. Jerry, Liam, Larry, Flor, and Ann from Bandon and Marian from USA were present. Flor gave the treasurer's report and stated that because of recent donations the castle restoration debt has been reduced from €14,000 to €12,000. **Jerry Lenz, St. Cloud, MN (**<u>ilenz@cloudnet.com</u>): This is exciting. I just discovered your wonderful website and am enjoying your newsletters. Is it possible to post an inquiry somewhere on your site?

I am having trouble tracing my great great grandfather Humphrey Crowley to his origins in Ireland, apparently somewhere in County Cork.

We think he immigrated to the USA in 1854 or 1855, perhaps on the Fidelia in December of 1855. He first appears in the Minnesota State Census in 1857 with Eliza Crowley who was also born in Ireland. Humphrey had a brother James in Galena Illinois.

It appears that Humphrey's parents were Humphrey and Julia Crowley. We know more about his life in this country, but nothing of his family in Ireland.

I am a retired mathematics teacher in St Cloud, Minnesota. Both my wife Mary Lou and I were born in LaCrosse, Wisconsin.

I believe Humphrey is an unusual name, so perhaps someone will recognize the family.

#### From the Crowley Archives Part 6

Registry of Deeds, Dublin 3rd June 1788: Eyre to Crowley Deed No 262970

This Deed was made between Edward Eyre Esquire, Lindville, County Tipperary and John Crowley, Macroom, County Cork "now and many years past Coachman to the said Edward Eyre". By this Deed John Crowley surrenders 5 acres of land at Fainmateen, County Tipperary previously leased to him by Edward Eyre his employer for the term of 99 years from 19th June 1787 at a yearly rent of one peppercorn (meaning for nothing). In return Edward Eyre leases to John Crowley "that part of the lands of Modeshial" (previously?) in possession of Bath (Bartholomew) Tobin and his under tenants, by William Hunt's survey one hundred occupied acres, one rood and twenty perches" in the Barony of Slievedagh\*\*, County Tipperary, "to have and to hold the said demised premises with the appurtenances unto the said John Crowley, his executors, administrators and appointees for the term of 99 years".

The Deed in favour of John Crowley comes into effect on the expiry of a previous Deed made on or about the 9th day of November 1765 in favour of Thomas Lloyd Price Esquire (now deceased) by Eyre Hedges, Elizabeth Rowan and Margaret Burke named as co-heirs of Edward Eyre, Esquire, for lands which included the "hundred occupied acres, one rood and twenty perches". My reading of this is that the 1765 Deed is therefore amended and that John Crowley got his lease at Modeshial with immediate effect.

Edward Eyre signed and sealed the Deed in the presence of William Wiltshire and an indecipherable signature

- \*Modeshial is modern Modeshil, barony of Slievedagh, parish of Modeshil, South Riding of Tipperary, later in the Poor Law Union of Callan, County Kilkenny.
- \*\*Slievedagh is in the parish of Lismalin, South Riding of Tipperary, later in the Poor Law Union of Callan, County Kilkenny. They are adjacent civil parishes.

Edward Eyre is likely of the house of Eyre of Eyrecourt, County Galway. This pedigree shows an Edward Eyre, High Sherriff County Galway in 1680, MP, who married Jane, daughter of Lord Maynard "and was by her the ancestor of the family of Hedges-Eyre of Macroom Castle". (*The Landed Gentry of Ireland 1958*). The fact of an Eyre family living at Macroom Castle, and of John Crowley being from Macroom suggest that Edward Eyre is of this family of Macroom Castle.

This is an extraordinary Deed. Why is Edward Eyre in effect giving over 100 occupied acres to his coachman? There is more to this than meets the eye. Was John Crowley his illegitimate son? Was Edward Eyre being blackmailed by him? We will never know, but my guess is John Crowley was his son.

### The History of the USS Crowley (DE-303)

Over the years, my mother Mary Crowley Korth told me that her cousin was killed on the USS Arizona at Pearl Harbor, HI on December 7, 1941. Years later I discovered that a Destroyer Escort was commissioned and named after her cousin.

Thomas Ewing Crowley, born 18 April 1902 in Madison, IL, enlisted in the Navy 6 March 1919 and was discharged 31 January 1923. A member of the Naval Reserve, he was commissioned assistant dental surgeon in 1929 and served at naval stations in Illinois, California, Cuba, New Jersey and at sea. He reported to Arizona (BB-39) 23 May 1941. Lieutenant Commander Crowley was killed during the Japanese air attach on Pearl Harbor.

Crowley (DE-303), an Evarts class Destroyer Escort, was launched on 22 September 1943 sponsored by Mrs. T. E. Crowley, widow of Lieutenant Commander T. E. Crowley, commissioned on 25 March 1944, and reported to the Pacific Fleet.

Crowley arrived at Pearl Harbor 31 May and joined in antisubmarine training exercises. Escorting a convoy she arrived at Gaudalcanal 25 August and reached Manus 14 September.

Between September and November 1944 Crowley sailed out of Manus escorting shipping during the invasion and consolidation with occasional voyages to Humboldt Bay, New Guinea, and the Solomons. On 26 September she joined Donaldson (DE-44) in assisting the SS Don Marquis, rescuing survivors and controlling fires to save her war cargo.

Crowley based at Ulithi from 21 November 1944 joining a group supporting the fast carrier task forces. In December 1944 the Crowley was at sea and in the vicinity of three destroyers that capsized during one of the most severe typhoons encountered in American naval history. Until February 1945 she escorted oilers to the ocean rendezvous at which they replenished carriers striking Luzon, Formosa, and the China coast, then operated with the oilers in the assault on Iwo Jima.

Crowley arrived at Guam 9 April and continued escorting oilers. From 3 July to the end of hostilities Crowley supported raids on the Japanese home islands and arrived at Sagami Wan, Honshu 9 September.

The Crowley was in Tokyo Bay when the peace documents were signed aboard the USS Missouri. Crowley departed Tokyo Bay 16 September 1945 and arrived at San Francisco 8 October. Crowley was decommissioned in December. She received five battle stars for World War II service.

The Crowley crew has had annual reunions since 1976. Several members of the Crowley family have attended and have been introduced to surviving crew members. The next reunion will be in Nashville, TN in October 2009.
