

The Skibbereen Heritage Center A Source for Genealogists

When doing genealogy in Ireland on the Crowley surname, a good source to have is the Heritage Center in Skibbereen, which is the second largest town in Cork County and the most southerly town in Ireland. In famine times and today, the Crowley surname is very common. Even if you don't know for sure where your Crowley ancestor lived in County Cork, the Heritage Center in Skibbereen is worth your time.

Prior to the 1600s, the McCarthy Clan held most of the land in Skibb (as it is known). The Crowley Clan was closely aligned with the McCarthys and fought with them in battle. McCarthy is the most common name in Skibb, but Crowley is also strongly represented there.

The Heritage Center is on the edge of the downtown area in the historic Gasworks Building on Upper Bridge Street, telephone (353) 28 40900; e-mail info@skibbheritage.com. It is situated on the banks of the River Ilen and has walking and picnic grounds on the riverside. It is a good place to watch birds and water fowl.

The staff is friendly and knowledgeable about local history. In addition to an excellent exhibit about prefamine history and a bookstore/gift shop, the center contains historical and genealogical records for the area. Many of the records can be accessed on the internet.

One database is of transcriptions from old graveyards in the area. This is an ongoing project of the Heritage Council. There are records from the 19th century Loan Fund institutions which provided credit to the poor. There are estate records from the Wrixon-Becher estate, and Tithe Applotment books from the 1820s and 1830s.

The center also has copies of Griffiths Valuation and 1901, 1911 Irish Census, and records from local churches. Searches are available for a donation.

The center is closed in the winter months, but is open March to November, Tuesday through Saturday, from 10am to 6pm.

Skibbereen is an interesting Irish town to visit. Their website is: www.skibbereen.ie/. The downtown is well preserved and has an historic feeling. It is an easy town for walking. Downtown streets are now one way, and traffic problems are not as bad as they used to be. It can be reached on R71 from Cork City. If you are in a self-catering cottage, it is a good town to visit for your groceries. There is also a lovely 18 hole golf course on the south side of town.

Notes from the Editor

In addition to the Skibbereen Heritage Center mentioned on page two, the center in Cobh has a multi-media exhibit that retraces the journey of the two and one-half million Irish people who emigrated from the port of Cobh during famine times. Many of our ancestors left from Cobh. Among others, there is also a center in Galway City that might be of interest to Crowleys traveling in the west of Ireland.

If you happen to be in Ireland between August 18 and 26 this summer, that week has been declared National Heritage Week in Ireland as a part Heritage Week in Europe. A variety of events are scheduled in County Cork ranging from a bell recital at St. Colman's in Cobh to a talk on piracy in Baltimore! It will be a great week to be in Ireland, but then isn't every week?

The Irish Surname Keohane

Last summer's newsletter, included an article entitled The Crowley Keohane Connection. In that article, it was pointed out that there is a strong connection between the two clans, and there is speculation that they are two part of the same overall clan. There is anecdotal evidence of families changing back and forth from one name to the other.

The article also quoted www.keohane.org as saying "the view now held is that we are a branch of the Crowleys who somehow got lost in a fog, the Irish word ceocháin certainly means fog or mist."

However, after reading two accounts of the Battle of Kinsale, I have not found a reference to any Crowleys being late for the battle. More likely the English were better equipped and better trained.

Interesting Facts about Ireland And The Crowley Clan

Bill Crowley who lives in Florida enjoys browsing the internet for information about Ireland and about Crowleys. Here are two interesting articles that he came upon recently.

Samuel Croley & The Revolutionary War

Original name: Samuel Crowley

Birth: c. 1750

Death: Oct. 10, 1774

Burial: Point Pleasant Cemetery, Point Pleasant, Mason County, West Virginia, USA

Samuel was the first American killed in the Revolutionary War. He died in the first battle of the Revolution.

The monument which carries the Crowley name is located at the battleground at the place where the Great Kanawha River flows into the Ohio. It is called Point Pleasant and is now a park, site of a battle on 10 Oct 1774 between a coalition of 800 Shawnee, Mingo & Delaware against Virginia forces under Colonel Andrew Lewis. About 51 Virginians were killed that day.

Note on Samuel:

Samuel was the fourth child of Jeffery Crowley (Croley) and his wife Effie. He was born in Virginia and married Elizabeth Strong. They had seven children: Effanniah, James, Mary, John, Agnes, Littleberry), and William). After Samuel's death, Elizabeth moved to Georgia.

Niall of the Nine Hostages

Niall was High King of Ireland from 377 to 404 AD. His father was Eochaidh Muigh-Medon, of the Celtic line of Erimhon or Heremon and his mother was Carthann Cas Dubh, daughter of the king of Britain.

Niall's ancestry can be traced back to Miledh or Milesius of Esbain, King of Spain, whose wife was the daughter of the Egyptian Pharaoh Nectonibus and who was the ancestor of all the Celts in Ireland. From there the line goes back fifteen generations to Niul, from whom the river Nile got its name, who was married to the daughter of Pharaoh Cingris, who drowned in the Red Sea when Moses rejoined the parted waters after the Israelites had made good their escape.

As High King of Ireland, Niall reigned from the ancient Irish royal seat at Tara, in modern County Meath. During his reign he conquered all of Ireland and Scotland as well as much of Britain and Wales. He took a royal hostage from each of the nine kingdoms he subjugated, hence his famous nickname.

Note on Niall: A study at Trinity College Dublin, found that a striking percentage of Irish men share the same Y chromosome, suggesting that "Niall of the Nine Hostages" may be the ancestor of one in 12 Irishmen. Niall established a dynasty of chieftains who dominated the island for six centuries.
