

Hi! I contacted you years ago when looking for my Crowley roots. Found them! But, I am not a Crowley. My mother was! My maiden name was Morse, and my married name is Gallegos. Can I still go to the gathering in 2016? Do you have any approximate idea as to cost? Any info would be appreciated.

FYI, in case anyone else was interested in MY line of Crowleys: My mother Georgia Merle Crowley was the daughter of Leo Lafayette Crowley (born 18 Nov 1892 in Emmett, Michigan) who died on 11 March 1922 in Miami, Arizona. He was the son of Paul Crowley (also known as Peter Paul) who was born in 21 August 1858 in Port Huron Michigan, and his wife Maude E. Cook.

Paul was the son of Thomas Crowley, immigrant from Ireland, who was born there in 1830, and his wife Anna Foley, whom he married in 1856 in Emmett, Michigan. There is a beautiful tombstone for Thomas Crowley and his wife Anna in Kenockee Cemetery, in Emmett, St. Clair County, Michigan. So there you have it.

Because my grandfather died so young, he only had one child, my mother. But he had siblings, and there are other Crowleys out there from this Crowley line!

I am looking for anyone who may have a connection to my Great, Great, Great Grandfather Cornelius Crowley, born in 1790 the townland of Ballinvragnosig, civil parish of Cullen R.C. Parish of Clonstead Barony of Kilnalea East Riding of County Cork. He came to Canada around 1825, worked in New York State for about 5 years then went to the Peterborough Ontario area Otonabee Twp. He had one son James that



we know of. He had 3 brothers who ended up in Canada, James, David and Patrick.

Michael O'Brien, my great great grandfather, was born in Ireland, presumably somewhere in Cork, on 1 Feb 1814. He next shows up in Hinesburg, Vermont married to Amy Vancor. They had a child in 1841, so far the one born the earliest that I have found, and my great grandmother, Mary O'Brien, in 1849. He died in Hinesburg on 12 Jun 1895.

Michael's parents as shown on his death record are John O'Brien and Ellen Crowley and his place of birth on his death record and all US census records is just "Ireland." I've looked at all their children as well to see if the place of birth is more specific, but nothing else is listed. The only reasons I think they are from Cork is that years ago my father mentioned his great grandfather came from Cork.

If anyone has information on ships lists during that time it would be very helpful. The few ships I have seen just say the number of people, but don't list them. My guess is he likely came in through Boston, Massachusetts or into Canada and then down into Vermont. Hinesburg is in Northwestern Vermont.

Our Spanish Cousin

My name is Antonio Castro from Barcelona, Spain, and a few months ago I began to make a family tree just to know the origin of my family. I found that the grandmother of my grandmother was ADELAIDA RIQUELME O'CROWLEY, but at this time I was unable to find nothing other than that she was born in Cadiz, Spain.

I also found that Pedro Alonso O'Crowley O'Donnell from Cadiz was the son of Dermot O'Crowley Power and Mary O'Donnell Davrin who married in Limerick, Munster and then took a boat to Cadiz. Why? I don't know. But two weeks ago I was able to find that Dermot O'Crowley and Mary O'Donnell had nine children, and one of them was CATALINA O'CROWLEY O'DONNELL mother of ADELAIDA.

I really want to give the clan information about the branches of the tree that are descendants of O'Crowley.

Editor's Note: Seamus Crowley, in his booklet *The O'Crowley Clan, Some Historical Notes*, mentioned Pedro Alonso O'Crowley and even included a portrait of him. Nevertheless, it was a surprise to hear from one of his descendents. Antonio says that he is interested in visiting Ireland and may try to attend the 2016 gathering. Hopefully we can all meet our Spanish cousin then.

The following is from Seamus' booklet:

Pedro Alonso O'Crouley was born in Cadiz in 1740. Both his parents had emigrated from Ireland. His father Dermetrio (Diarmuid or Jeremiah) was from Limerick claiming descent from Cormac O'Crowley born in Carbery, Co. Cork in 1550. His mother was an O'Donnell from Bally Murphy in Co. Clare.

At nine years old he was sent to France where he got a classical education from the Augustinians at Senlis. He chose to follow a career as a merchant and got a licence for Veracruz and made his first journey to Mexico at the age of 24. Over the next ten years he repeated the journey several times and built up a large fortune from his trading business.

While in Mexico, or "New Spain" as it was called, he gathered every bit of information he could about the country and its history, geology, vegetation, animals, etc. and wrote up his findings in the "Idea compendiosa" – A description of the Kingdom of New Spain" in 1774.

After returning from Mexico O'Crowley stayed on in Cadiz pursuing his interests in antiquities and history. In 1794 he published a catalogue of his private collections called "Musaei o'croulanei". It lists over 5,000 Greek and Roman coins and 200 paintings including works by Van Dyck, Rubens, Murillo, Velaquez, Zurbaran and Ribera. He also had many geological specimens he had gathered in New Spain.

The Crowley Clan DNA Project By Catherine Crowley Budd

It is 30 years since a British scientist discovered how to identify individuals by their DNA. Professor Alec Jeffreys of Leicester University remembers the eureka moment that changed police investigations forever (BBC September 9, 2014). All of us who have an interest in our ancestry have Professor Alec Jeffreys to thank for the technology which helps us identify our family links.

Your Y-Chromosome is a sex chromosome. Sex chromosomes carry the genetic code that makes each of us male or female. All people inherit two sex chromosomes. One comes from their mother and the other from their father. All men receive a Y-Chromosome from their father and an X-Chromosome from their mother. Men and only men inherit their father's Y-Chromosome. Thus, it follows the same path of inheritance as your direct paternal line.

Paternal line DNA testing uses STR markers which are places where your genetic code has a variable number of repeated parts. STR marker values change slowly from one generation to the next. Testing multiple markers gives us distinctive result sets. These sets form signatures for a paternal lineage. We compare your set of results to those of other men in our database. The range of possible generations before you share a common ancestor with a match depends on the level of test you take. A match may be recent, but it may also be hundreds of years in the past. The Crowley DNA project began in September 2005. Tom Crowley former Taoiseach started looking into a DNA test to help link genetic cousins. He wrote an article for the newsletter which was published in July 2005. I contacted him about the test and he persuaded me to be the administrator, partly because of my medical background as a Nurse Practitioner and partly because of my own search for my family origins.

Little did I know that my home would be almost completely destroyed a month later by Hurricane Wilma and I would spend the next 18 months living in a FEMA trailer outside our home while trying to get the project off the ground. I was very lucky to have reasonable internet access after the hurricane and a notebook computer to work on.

From these humble beginnings with just five participants we have now a total of 115 who are members of our group. We have had several matches including my father and our line in Ireland. Please consider participating in the project. There is no medical information identified from testing, and the results are private. Cost for the recommended 37 marker test is \$149 USD plus \$9.99 for shipping and handling. Results take between 6 and 8 weeks. Additional testing can be added on at any time.
