

Last Call for Bantry 2016 Crowley Gathering

In approximately three months time, Crowleys from all over the world will convene on the picturesque town of Bantry in West Cork. If you plan to be one of them, now is the time to review your travel schedule and determine if all the i's are dotted and the t's are crossed.

There is still time to send in your registration fee of 150 Euros per person to our Crowley Clan Cisteoir (treasurer), James Crowley in Bantry.

James writes:

"As regards payment, login to PAYPAL, Select MONEY on the top toolbar, select SEND PAYMENTS down the left hand side, enter my email (James@obriencussen.com) in the box, enter (150 per person) in the amount box, select EUROS in the currency box, tick the box I'M SENDING MONEY TO FAMILY AND FRIENDS, press CONTINUE, and the process should be finished. I am looking forward to seeing you all in September."

The Maritime Hotel is the primary venue for the gathering, but you will find other hotels, B&Bs, and holiday house rentals on the internet. Bantry is a reasonably small town, and taxis are available.

Registration is scheduled to begin at 1400 hours (2:00 pm) at the Maritime.

At 1800 hours (6:00 pm) a wine and cheese reception will follow at J.J. Crowleys Pub which is a short walk from the Maritime.

Saturday and Sunday will be filled with sightseeing and field trips at historical areas which have special significance to the Crowley Clan. On Saturday there will be an outdoor Mass at Kilshallow, the traditional home of the Crowleys. And Sunday Also on Saturday night, there will be our traditional banquet at the Maritime Hotel.

West Cork is a wild and scenic land dotted with historical sites. Distances between towns are short, and the Irish roads are exciting!

My mother's maiden name is Crowley, and she has often mentioned her roots going back to County Cork. Her father was Gene Crowley.

Here is some information: My great grandfather was named James Crowley from County Cork. He moved to Wealdstone, Harrow in his 30's. He had two sons. Eugene Crowley became a popular singer for the BBC in the 1930's and '40s and Dennis became a priest.

My mother has gold medals that were passed down to her from her father awarded to an apparent relative in Cork who won several piano competitions.

The medals:

Gold from 1923 and 1927 and read "Mary Hayes, Feif" on one side and "AMR A M" on the other.

From the Editor:

We are often told the importance of compiling a family health history for the benefit of our health and the health of our descendants. Diseases can run in families and be carried on generation after generation. A good time to start your history would be while gathering general information for your family tree.

Death certificates are the best way to document the date of an ancestor's death. However, they are also the source of information as to the causes of death. Some older records will also list the duration of the final illness. This is potentially important information for you and your family. It is information that can alert you to areas of weakness in the health of your family.

Tennise Gallogos, whose mother was a Crowley, has undertaken a brave attempt to piece together the illness that has affected her family for several generations. Here is her letter:

"I have found that a specific profile of mental illness runs in my Crowley line. It involves either bi-polar disorder or schizoid-affective disorder and eating disorders. I know this isn't the kind of information we're all looking for when we try to find out about our ancestors and our roots, but I believe this kind of information can be very helpful to family members who find themselves struggling to understand the behavior of a loved one. It "skips" people, like me, but not one of my children. However, I really believe in this kind of

family profile.

My father, not related to the Crowleys, had severe bi-polar disorder, but there are no reports of any of his family members having it. In doing research, I have found that some very prominent families have had this mental illness profile crop up periodically. I was astonished, but also relieved to understand it can happen to any family.


My son talked to his daughter and told her there is an extensive history of mental illness in the family, and that she should be aware of herself and come to her parents if she felt she might need help. She's twelve, but she did come to them to tell them she had anxiety and depression. That's the kind of outcome I hope for in doing a mental health profile of a family. Usually, it's not possible, because people tried to hide these problems."

be thinking about you.


John "Jack" Crowley, Vancouver, Washington, USA

Samuel Crowley's Revolutionary Story by Jenny L. Cote



I am a children's author in Atlanta and am currently working on my seventh historical fiction novel in a series called The Voice, the Revolution, and the Key. The main character is Patrick Henry, and this will be a trilogy of books from 1743 to 1799 encompassing Patrick's life and the Revolutionary War. I'm happy to tell you that I am a descendant of Samuel Crowley through his son Littleberry. My grandmother, Mildred Barringer is 102 so she could be your oldest living Crowley. (She currently is not doing well, however, and we could lose her soon.) But I wanted to tell you that I will be including Samuel's story at the Battle of Point Pleasant and definitively making him the first patriot to die in the Revolutionary War.

Since his wife Elizabeth was from Hanover County, where Patrick Henry was also from, I've written her in as a childhood friend of Patrick's wife, Sarah Shelton. In fact, I'm having Samuel and Benjamin Crowley attend Patrick and Sarah's wedding in order to get the Crowley boys over to Hanover County to meet the Strong girls! I've taken a tad bit of liberties with their ages to make it work. But it was important in the novel for Patrick to meet Samuel and Elizabeth.

I tracked down the Journal of the VA House of Burgesses for Elizabeth's pension petition, but also later the document where Governor Patrick Henry himself increased the amount she received a few years later. I needed to establish the relationship with them early on. I visited Point Pleasant last year in my research and was thrilled to see Samuel's name on two markers there, even though the name is misspelled on the battery as "Samuel Corley."

My uncle traced our lineage from Littleberry through both my grandmother and my grandfather's lines, they were cousins from two lines, so it's hard to unravel! We've got a gap in hers that I haven't been able to figure out with a "Lucinda" from both lines. Are they two people or is one of the connecting names off? I know my grandmother would talk about "Littleberry" when she would recount family history, but we're missing something along the way:

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I wish to figure out definitively, so I can confirm on paper that I am 100% positive a descendant of Samuel Crowley, and so I can apply for my DAR application and make a big deal of Samuel with this next book.
